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


#### **Definitions**

- c The literal character c.
- C A single (required) character.
- P<sub>s</sub> A single (usually optional) numeric parameter, composed of one of more digits.
- $P_m$  A multiple numeric parameter composed of any number of single numeric parameters, separated by ; character(s). Individual values for the parameters are listed with  $P_s$ .
- $P_t$  A text parameter composed of printable characters.

#### C1 (8-Bit) Control Characters

The *xterm* program recognizes both 8-bit and 7-bit control characters. It generates 7-bit controls (by default) or 8-bit if S8C1T is enabled. The following pairs of 7-bit and 8-bit control characters are equivalent:





These control characters are used in the vtXXX emulation.

#### VT100 Mode

Most of these control sequences are standard VT102 control sequences, but there is support for later DEC VT terminals (i.e., VT220 and VT320), as well as ISO 6429 and *aixterm* color controls. VT102 features not supported are auto-repeat and blinking characters. There are additional control sequences to provide *xterm*-dependent functions, such as the scrollbar or window size. Where the function is specified by DEC or ISO 6429, the code assigned to it is given in parentheses. The escape codes to designate and invoke character sets are specified by ISO 2022; see that document for a discussion of character sets.


The 8 colors which may be set using  $\boxed{1}$   $\boxed{0}$  through  $\boxed{1}$   $\boxed{7}$  are denoted *dynamic colors*, since the corresponding control sequences were the first means for setting **xterm**'s colors dynamically, i.e., after it was started. They are not the same as the ANSI colors. One or more parameters is expected for  $P_t$ . Each succesive parameter changes the next color in the list. The value of  $P_s$  tells the starting point in the list. The colors are specified by name or RGB specification as per *XParseColor*.

If *xterm* does minimal translation of the function keys, it usually does this with a PC-style keyboard, so PC-style function keys result. Sun keyboards are similar to PC keyboards. Both have cursor and scrolling operations printed on the keypad, which duplicate the smaller cursor and scrolling keypads.

X does not predefine NumLock (used for VT220 keyboards) or Alt (used as an extension for the Sun/PC keyboards) as modifiers. These keys are recognized as modifiers when enabled by the **numLock** resource, or by the DECSET  $1 \ 0 \ 3 \ 5$  control sequence.

The cursor keys transmit the following escape sequences depending on the mode specified via the **DECCKM** escape sequence.

## **Sun-Style Function Keys**

The *xterm* program provides support for Sun keyboards more directly, by a menu toggle that causes it to send Sunstyle function key codes rather than VT220. Note, however, that the *sun* and *VT100* emulations are not really compatible. For example, their wrap-margin behavior differs.

Only function keys are altered; keypad and cursor keys are the same. The emulation responds identically. See the xterm-sun terminfo entry for details.

### **HP-Style Function Keys**

Similarly, xterm can be compiled to support HP keyboards. See the xterm-hp terminfo entry for details.

#### **Mouse Tracking**

The VT widget can be set to send the mouse position and other information on button presses. These modes are typically used by editors and other full-screen applications that want to make use of the mouse.

There are six mutually exclusive modes. One is DEC Locator mode, enabled by the DECELR  $\[ \] P_s \[ \]$ ;  $\[ \] P_s \[ \]$  control sequence, and is not described here (control sequences are summarized above). The remaining five modes are each enabled (or disabled) by a different parameter in DECSET  $\[ \] P_m \[ \]$  or DECRST  $\[ \] P_m \[ \]$  control sequence.

Manifest constants for the parameter values are defined in **xcharmouse.h** as follows:

The motion reporting modes are strictly *xterm* extensions, and are not part of any standard, though they are analogous to the DEC VT200 DECELR locator reports.

Parameters (such as pointer position and button number) for all mouse tracking escape sequences generated by *xterm* encode numeric parameters in a single character as *value*+32. For example, ! specifies the value 1. The upper left character position on the terminal is denoted as 1,1.

X10 compatibility mode sends an escape sequence only on button press, encoding the location and the mouse button pressed. It is enabled by specifying parameter 9 to DECSET. On button press, *xterm* sends  $\boxed{\text{CSI}} \boxed{\text{M}} C_b C_x C_y$  (6 characters).  $C_b$  is button–1.  $C_x$  and  $C_y$  are the x and y coordinates of the mouse when the button was pressed.

Normal tracking mode sends an escape sequence on both button press and release. Modifier key (shift, ctrl, meta) information is also sent. It is enabled by specifying parameter 1000 to DECSET. On button press or release, *xterm* sends  $\boxed{\text{Csi}} \boxed{\text{M}} C_b C_x C_y$ . The low two bits of  $C_b$  encode button information: 0=MB1 pressed, 1=MB2 pressed, 2=MB3 pressed, 3=release. The next three bits encode the modifiers which were down when the button was pressed and are added together: 4=Shift, 8=Meta, 16=Control. Note however that the shift and control bits are normally unavailable because *xterm* uses the control modifier with mouse for popup menus, and the shift modifier is used in the default translations for button events. The *Meta* modifier recognized by *xterm* is the *mod1* mask, and is not necessarily the "Meta" key (see *xmodmap*).  $C_x$  and  $C_y$  are the x and y coordinates of the mouse event, encoded as in X10 mode.

Wheel mice may return buttons 4 and 5. Those buttons are represented by the same event codes as buttons 1 and 2 respectively, except that 64 is added to the event code. Release events for the wheel buttons are not reported.

Mouse hilite tracking notifies a program of a button press, receives a range of lines from the program, highlights the region covered by the mouse within that range until button release, and then sends the program the release coordinates. It is enabled by specifying parameter 1001 to DECSET. Highlighting is performed only for button 1, though other button events can be received. **Warning:** use of this mode requires a cooperating program or it will hang *xterm*. On button press, the same information as for normal tracking is generated; *xterm* then waits for the program to send mouse tracking information. *All X events are ignored until the proper escape sequence is received from the pty:*  $\begin{bmatrix} cst \end{bmatrix} P_s \begin{bmatrix} cst \end{bmatrix} P_s \begin{bmatrix}$

The parameters are *startx*, *starty*, *endx*, *endy*, *mousex*, and *mousey*. *startx*, *starty*, *endx*, and *endy* give the starting and ending character positions of the region. *mousex* and *mousey* give the location of the mouse at button up, which may not be over a character.

Button-event tracking is essentially the same as normal tracking, but *xterm* also reports button-motion events. Motion events are reported only if the mouse pointer has moved to a different character cell. It is enabled by specifying parameter 1002 to DECSET. On button press or release, *xterm* sends the same codes used by normal tracking mode. On button-motion events, *xterm* adds 32 to the event code (the third character,  $C_p$ ). The other bits of the event code specify button and modifier keys as in normal mode. For example, motion into cell x,y with button 1 down is reported as  $C_{SI}$  M Q  $C_y$ . (Q = 32 + 0 (button 1) + 32 (motion indicator)). Similarly, motion with button 3 down is reported as  $C_{SI}$  M Q  $C_y$ . (Q = 32 + 2 (button 3) + 32 (motion indicator)).

Any-event mode is the same as button-event mode, except that all motion events are reported, even if no mouse button is down. It is enabled by specifying 1003 to DECSET.

#### **Tektronix 4014 Mode**

Most of these sequences are standard Tektronix 4014 control sequences. Graph mode supports the 12-bit addressing of the Tektronix 4014. The major features missing are the write-through and defocused modes. This document does not describe the commands used in the various Tektronix plotting modes but does describe the commands to switch modes.
